Crackley Pupils Celebrate Outstanding LAMDA Results

At Crackley Hall pupils from Junior 1 to Junior 6 study for the London Academy of Music and Dramatic Art (LAMDA) examinations in their Drama lessons.

All 79 Crackley Hall School Junior 5 and Junior 6 pupils who took the LAMDA examinations in February passed with the overwhelming majority, over 75%, achieving a distinction. Studying for the Grade 1 or Grade 2 Speaking Verse and Prose the children had prepared two poems to perform.

Then in June, pupils in Junior 1 and Junior 2 received their LAMDA examination results. They also achieved a 100% pass rate, with all the children being awarded the top grades of Merit and Distinction.

Junior 1 and Junior 2 studied the Introductory Syllabus where pupils are expected to recite a poem and then discuss a favourite toy.

They all worked so hard, huge congratulations to them all.

Nuneaton Festival of Arts

17 pupils from Crackley Hall School celebrated after winning the Meredith Cup for Choral Speaking at the 2023 Nuneaton Festival of Arts.

Crackley Hall's Key Stage 2 Performance Poetry Club competed in the Juniors competition, in the Speech and Drama section of the festival at the Abbey Theatre in Nuneaton.

The Group were awarded first place and 'Distinction' with a superb score of 88%, with the judge commenting on their perfect synchronisation.

Drama teacher, Nicki Wildey, was delighted, commenting, "We are so proud of the children's commitment to Performance Poetry. They have worked really hard and to come first is such an achievement. They have made us, their parents and the whole school very proud."





Full Marks For Crackley Hall School

Following an inspection by the Independent Schools Inspectorate's (ISI) Regulatory Compliance team Crackley Hall School was delighted to report that it had passed the Inspection with full marks, with the school meeting all the requirements in every section.

Rainforest Biomes

Junior 6 started the year finding out about one of the world's biomes – the rainforest. They studied whereabouts in the world they would find these ecosystems and what the climate is like there to support and sustain such a vast array of life. They looked at the structure and layers of the forest and the many different species of birds and animals that inhabit it, before watching some amazing footage from the *Planet Earth* series and compiling their own fact files.



Tree of Life

After researching the life and work of vibrant symbolist Gustav Klimt, pupils focused on one of his most famous works: *The Tree of Life.* Both Junior 6 classes explored the patterns and colours in his work and then went onto craft their own trees in response, using a variety of media.



Consequences

Junior 6 considered the consequences that come with every choice they make. They read the *Story of the Fall* from the book of *Genesis* and discussed the actions of Adam and Eve and the consequences that came from their choice to take the apple. They looked at a range of fictional scenarios and considered the right choices and how even when we make the right choice, sometimes the consequences may not always be positive. The unit finished with them exploring Michael Rosen's poetry from his *Big Book of Bad Things*.



Circulation

Junior 6 investigated circulation and found out how and why the blood is pumped around the body. They became blood cells for a lesson, travelling in a figure of eight between the heart, lungs, and body, becoming oxygenated and deoxygenated as they travelled. Their heart then began to pump faster, emulating exercise, so the blood cells had to circulate more quickly in order to keep up with the body's demands. **Junior 6V**



Descriptive Language

In English, pupils stepped into the shoes of 'Jim' from *The Christmas Truce*. They constructed letters home explaining what happened on that eventful day, exploring how to show their emotions and feelings in their writing. Their descriptive phrases and emotive language created some very poignant and heart-felt letters home, and showed the fabulous maturity of their written work.



First World War

The class were visited by a soldier from the First World War in November and took part in an engaging and informative workshop. Listening to excerpts from a soldier's diary, pupils were able to understand the complex emotions of an enlisted soldier; the camaraderie, duty, fear, guilt, and fatigue to name but a few. They also learnt about the realities of life in the trenches and had the opportunity to try on uniforms and gas masks and even handle weapons. It was a fantastic interactive experience for all involved!



Baking Bread

During enrichment week, the children had great fun baking bread, carefully measuring out the ingredients, mixing them together, then kneading, pushing and pulling their dough. Everyone enjoyed getting hands on to create trays of bread rolls and the more creative even made their own hedgehog rolls. There were many comments from hungry staff about the wonderful smell wafting through the hall! What a fantastic skill for them all to learn.



Bake Off

The post exams traditional Bake Off took place in early December, and everyone enjoyed putting their creative skills on show. There were reindeers, snowmen, space odysseys, a bouquet of flowers and even a Titanic. The attention to detail and ingenuity was a sight to behold.

This year's winners were 1st Matilda, Jessie and Nell, 2nd Penny and 3rd Kate, Lexi and Mairen. Well done to everyone who took part!



French Pen Pals

Junior 6 practised key French vocabulary to prepare for a meeting with their French penpals via Teams. They played a game where they were tasked with finding the person who had the correct answer to a question using only what they had learned in lesson! They were all excited about the chance to talk face-to-face to their new friends and learn more about what life might be like for children on the other side of the Channel.



Silhouette Art

In Art, the children created silhouettes of images linked to the First World War. They looked at the colours in a sunset and likened them to images from the Great War photographers, who captured soldiers standing close to bomb blasts at the Somme and Flanders Field. They began by cutting out their soldiers, landscapes, or other silhouettes, from black card. Then they layered crêpe paper with PVA glue to build up the coloured background. They used a wide range of techniques including lamination, to create these thoughtprovoking images.



Timeline of Planet Earth

In Science, Junior 6 learned about the history of life on *Planet Earth.* They investigated when and where life first started, all the way up to the present day. They covered crucial landmarks, such as the first single celled organism, the Ice Age, the first fish, the first amphibian and the first 'modern' human. In groups, the children were tasked with labelling the key points of the evolution of life on a 20-metre-long tape measure that represented 3,600 million years of life on earth.

They went on to study the life and work of famous naturalist Charles Darwin and as a final activity the children were tasked with being naturalists themselves and predicting what humans might look like in the notso-distant future. There were all sorts of fantastic ideas such as long fingers for using our phones, gills for breathing underwater and even tails!



Chain Connection

As part of Mental Health Week, Junior 6 explored the topic of connectivity and created paper chains to show how we are all inter-linked. The children wrote words on each chain, firstly showing in what ways we can work to be connected (kindness, empathy, strength, compassion), then they wrote words that they felt make a good friend (loyalty, forgiveness, fun, listening), and finally they wrote words that could help to rebuild any break down in connectivity (smiling, saying sorry, forgiving). They linked all their chains together to form a Junior 6 Chain of Connectivity!



Debate Skills

Pupils developed their debating skills in readiness for an inter-school debating tournament. The children were grouped and given a statement to discuss and prepare arguments for and against. They were then asked as a group to take part in a proper debate, remembering to always be confident and respectful. Everyone took to the task brilliantly and we were all impressed with their opinions.




Laws of Reflection

Junior 6 studied the laws of reflection in their Science lessons. They learned how light reflects from different surfaces to create mirror images and diffuse scattering. They experimented by creating their own light boxes to send a narrow beam of light to a mirror proving that the angle of incidence does indeed equal the angle of reflection. Then, they created optical illusions, making pencils bend through light's refractive properties in water.



French Theatre

Pupils enjoyed a fantastic afternoon of interactive French theatre when Onatti Productions performed the play, 'Parlezvous Français? Everyone enjoyed and engaged with the challenge of following the story of Archie who finds himself in a French hospital trying to get by with his basic French. The play included many words and phrases which the children recognised and introduced new vocabulary in a fun way. Some pupils even had the chance to join in the performance on stage. It was a fantastic learning experience for them all.



The Spiderwick Chronicles

Junior 6 worked in their sketch books with Ms Holmes in a themed link with their English book, *The Spiderwick Chronicles* by Holly Black. They created images of different 'faerie' creatures from ponds, rivers, woods and forests using their knowledge of *The Spiderwick Field Guide*. They looked at the creative work of Tony Di Terlizzi, Walter Crane and Arthur Rackham. The use of pen and ink gave their work a suitable, magical wash. Alongside, each creature was given a name and details of its habitat and preferred diet.



Colour Wheels

The children made their own colour wheels and discovered that white light is made up of the colours of the rainbow and how, when travelling fast enough, those colours merge to create white. They also experimented with a selection of prisms to investigate how rainbows are created. In the last session, they delved into shadows in more detail and created shadow puppets. They focused on how they could change the silhouette and light source to change the clarity and shape of the shadow created.



Road Safety

Warwickshire's Road Safety Team ran a special session to refresh pupils' knowledge and understanding of road safety. As well as developing their road awareness they looked at why young people can fail to act safely when they are out and about on the roads.

During their session, pupils learned to identify impulsive behaviour and how to develop coping strategies to enable them to stay safe. All good preparation for their move to secondary school.



Leavers' Hoodies

In May, Junior 6 received their Leavers' Hoodies, and they were all quick to put them on. They looked so amazing, that we took a photo to share. Now a tradition for most schools, we know that the hoodies will always be a tangible memory of their time at Crackley Hall and their fellow pupils. They provide a sense of belonging and of community and in the long distant future we hope they will prompt wonderful memories of their school days.



Psalms

In RE, pupils considered the psalms and prayers used during Mass to help us connect with God and others. The children created their own Psalms centred around themselves, thinking about what they are grateful for and being honest about the mistakes everyone makes. It was wonderful to see the children take such pride in their work.



Independent Projects

Seven Junior 6 pupils took part in a new project at Crackley Hall School. Under the guidance of Mrs Cowlishaw, they undertook a cross-curricular independent research project on a topic of their choice. The initiative was an exciting intellectual opportunity designed to develop a wide range of skills. In the last week of term, the pupils presented their self-directed projects to Headmaster, Mr Duigan. The projects fostered free learning, critical thinking, creativity and independence and proved to be a fantastic and exciting opportunity for the pupils involved.



Getting To Know One Another

To start the new school year, Junior 5 completed a 'Getting to Know One Another' piece of artwork that showed their profile in silhouette and was filled in with illustrations all about themselves. It was a great way to share and talk about their interests and helped everyone know each other better.



Amazing Aztecs

To kickstart their study of the Aztecs, Junior 5 extrapolated information from texts, maps, pictures and videos to discover the geography of the Aztec Empire. They showed great curiosity and asked many questions as they located Lake Texcoco, Mexico City and Tenochtitlan and produced clearly labelled maps in their workbooks.



Creation Stories

Junior 5 studied creation stories in their RE lessons. They explored the Chinese, Inuit, Hindu and Christian creation stories, creating comic strips to retell the Chinese and Christian stories from beginning to end. The children watched a video clip about each story and through discussion they determined seven steps to the stories that became the model for the comic strips. They discovered some similarities and differences between the stories.



Language Learning

As part of the school's activities to mark European Day of Languages Junior 5 explored idioms in other languages and attempted to decipher what they meant. Junior 5W

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Nelson Mandela

Junior 5 engaged with Black History Month across the curriculum. In PSHE, Mrs Duigan gave an interesting talk about Nelson Mandela and her own experiences of growing up in South Africa. While in their English lessons, Junior 5 completed a comprehension, that expanded their knowledge of Nelson Mandela further.



Maths Challenge

Crackley took two teams of Junior 5 mathematicians to compete in Princethorpe's Maths Challenge. The pupils completed a series of exciting and challenging puzzles against the clock. The event was huge fun for all and Crackley's teams finished in 6th and 10th place out of the 36 teams taking part.



Pen Pals

There was plenty of excitement when Junior 5 received their first letters from their French pen pals. They loved finding out about their pen pal's favourite foods, subjects, siblings, and friends. The children worked hard to produce some fantastic letters to send back to their French friends and their standard of written French was impressive. In December the children were delighted to have the chance to see and speak to their new friends when Madame Westerman organised a Teams video call. They enjoyed introducing themselves and listening to and speaking French to native speakers.



Odd Socks Day

To mark the start of Anti-Bullying Week, the children came to school wearing brightly coloured odd socks. The children took part in many activities throughout the week, including an anti-bullying assembly, a PSHE lesson, various lively discussions, role play activities, as well as designing their very own pair of odd socks.



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Advent Wreaths

In RE, the children explored the history and symbolism of the Advent wreath. They learnt that: the first two candles are purple and mean Hope and Love, the third candle is pink and represents Joy and the fourth candle is purple and represents Peace. The children thought carefully about when they had experienced hope, love, joy and peace in their lives before creating their own advent wreaths using coloured pencils, paper and scissors.



States of America

In their Geography lessons, Junior 5 had great fun finding ways to remember the 50 states of the USA. They decided that singing them was by far the best way, particularly when repeated and sung faster and faster every time! The catchy song also served as a challenging tongue twister which certainly put their vocal and diction skills to the test.



Accelerated Reader

Junior 5 were raring to go when the school introduced a new reading scheme. There was much excitement as they used their personalised scores to choose from a range of new books in the library. The children were diligent in reading at home every day recording each session into their reading records ready for their English teacher to check. Once they finished their books, they then took a quiz before they progressed to their next reading book. It proved a great way to help everyone improve their reading skills.



Tudor Day

Junior 5 travelled back in time to the 1500s when they took part in a Tudor Day. They enjoyed a variety of practical activities immersing themselves in the daily life of the Tudors; from leather stamping, soap making and embroidery to candle making and even as miniature artists. It was an exciting and stimulating day that finished with a live Tudor banquet with food from the period and the children providing the entertainment. There was dancing, storytelling, juggling, and plenty of Tudor foolery.



Winter Prints

Junior 5 used lino cuts to make Winter themed prints, producing simple yet effective pieces. Pupils spent time with their Art teacher, Ms Holmes, thinking about seasonal ideas that would work well, using paper to print on first as practice. The finished result was impressive. Great work from Junior 5.



Flower Dissection

To start of a new topic in Science, the children undertook a flower dissection. They learnt about the inside of a flower and had a productive time taking a flower apart to discover its different parts.



Island Design

As part of their study of *Kensuke's Kingdom*, pupils had the chance to design their own islands that they might like to be stranded on. Their designs had a variety of unique features such as: a ski hill, mountains, waterfalls, palm trees and many more. The children annotated their designs with key phrases and features and then completed a descriptive piece of writing about their island.



Fingerprints

Everyone enjoyed investigating fingerprints in their Science lessons as part of British Science Week. The practical experiment was designed to get them thinking about fingerprints, comparing different fingerprints, and seeing if they could identify any patterns. Pupils took turns inking their fingers and pressing them onto a chart. It was fascinating to see how everyone's fingerprints were different.



Tudor Portraits

As part of their study of the Tudor period, pupils spent several weeks learning how to set a portrait, Tudor style, with big shoulders, a commanding look and lots of great Tudor bling. They had fun creating their portraits using pearls, beads and plenty of glittering jewels. Their pictures were magnificent and made a great display in the Art Room.



Paschal Candles

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In their RE lessons, pupils revisited the Easter story and learned about the different elements of the Easter Vigil. They thought about the Paschal (Easter) Candle, which is a large, white candle lit during the Easter service. The Paschal Candle is a symbol of hope and new life and the children enjoyed creating their own Paschal Candles using paper, scissors, tape and colouring pencils.



Tudor Timeline

Junior 5 loved learning about the Tudors, and their final lesson on the topic saw them making their own timeline of Elizabeth I's reign. The children had an array of information, including pictures and captions of information at their disposal, and they had to work together to organise them into a historical timeline. It challenged their collaborative skills as well as the need to apply their previous learning to a different way of presenting information.



Globe Knowledge

In Geography, Junior 5 were fascinated with the globes and used them to find out the location of countries by imagining they were moles burying down through the earth and estimating where they would end up on the other side! They recorded their discoveries on a flat map of the world. They noticed the difference between looking at our world as a 3D sphere, and as a 2D map.



Bird Tables

Junior 5 created beautiful bird tables in DT. They used popsicle sticks, hammers, nails and hacksaws to create colourful hanging feast tables. Pupils began with a base and created a strong, initial design which they adapted as they went along. Pupils used their initiative to make their ideas come to life, learning lots of handy skills along the way.





Junior 4R



Swim School

In September, Junior 4 returned to school full of enthusiasm and ready to learn. Swim School was their first exciting challenge for the year, and everyone enjoyed getting on the bus to take the short drive down to the pool. There they all enthusiastically ventured into the water ready to improve their strokes.



Sound Science

Junior 4 really enjoyed exploring 'Sound' in Science and made and played an array of fabulous musical instruments. They had fun exploring pitch and made and decorated panpipes, which were merrily played by all.



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String Telephones

Junior 4 tested out string telephones to discover how sound works. They went outside and worked in pairs, sending a range of secret messages through plastic cups and along the string to their partners. They learnt that when you talk into the cup your voice vibrates the bottom of the cup. The sound vibrations are transferred to the string, across the string and into the bottom of the other cup, where they are then heard.



Faith Walk

Pupils from Winterfold House School joined Crackley Hall's Junior 4 in October for a Walk of Faith on Kenilworth Common. The children took part in different activities reflecting on Philippians 4:13 "I can do all things through him who strengthens me." Their afternoon session finished with some enthusiastic communal singing before the pupils walked back to school. **Junior 4S**



Tea Tasting

Junior 4 had a wonderful time finding ways to persuade people to buy their own bespoke tea. They started by having a tea tasting lesson, where they were asked to become tea connoisseurs and generate feel good phrases to help them with their persuasive writing. Some ideas included 'feel the sunset kiss your taste buds' and 'it was like a warm embrace on a cold winter's day'. They then used their vocabulary to create their own persuasive writing and we were all very impressed with their work.



Tea Boxes

Junior 4 worked creatively when designing their tea boxes, after making their own bespoke tea, as part of their work linked to their class novel - *Cloud Tea Monkeys*. They used an array of ambitious vocabulary to advertise their tea, hooking their buyers in with a range of rhetorical questions and offers which they couldn't possibly refuse! The tea boxes were adorned with vibrant and artistic labels. Instructions and ingredients were also added to further tempt potential purchasers. It was excellent work from them all.



Incredible India

Junior 4 ventured off to incredible India in their Geography lessons. They excitedly popped on their VR headsets and were transported to an array of Indian cities, bazaars and festivals and felt like they were actually there. One moment they were exploring the banks of the river Ganges and then, all of a sudden, they were wandering the marble paths of the Taj Mahal – all without needing their passport!



Measuring Mania

Pupils made measuring and recording fun when they went outside using a trundle wheel to estimate and measure the area of places around the school. They visited the hall, the astro playground and the lower playground recording their measurements. Then they returned to the classroom to compare their answers. They had lots of larger numbers to multiply but all enjoyed being outdoors for their Maths lesson.



Save the Trees

At the end of the Michaelmas Term, the children learned about the importance of trees. To help communicate these important messages Junior 4 designed their own posters. It was wonderful to see how much the children cared about protecting these incredible organisms and their enthusiasm for finding solutions to climate change was inspiring.



Ice Cube Challenge

Junior 4 took on an ice cube challenge, where they tried to keep an ice cube solid for as long as possible. Pupils had to learn a variety of key facts, such as the temperatures of the classroom, and what an insulator is, to help keep the cubes as cool as possible. They had a lot of fun investigating and most of the cubes impressively lasted for hours!



Touch Typing Challenge

Junior 4 practised their touch-typing skills, to prepare for their much-awaited competition against Crescent School. They perfected their Qwertyuiop skills and strengthened their finger speed, in preparation for typing as many words as possible in a small amount of time!



3D Elephants

Junior 4 made their own 3D elephants in English, as part of their work on their class novel, *The Girl Who Stole An Elephant*. They then used a range of ambitious vocabulary, alliteration and similes to describe their amazing elephants, which formed the basis for a descriptive, opening paragraph to a short adventure story.



Teeth Test

In Science, Junior 4 investigated the effects of various solutions on teeth. They used eggs to resemble the enamel on teeth and sat the shell in various solutions - vinegar, coca-cola, lemon juice, water or mouthwash. They predicted what would happen and then observed the effects on the eggshells over the next few weeks.



Digestive System

Junior 4 created life-size models of the human body and labelled the key organs when they began their study of the digestive system.



Fantastic Fractions

Pupils investigated Fractions in their Maths lessons. Using a variety of games and equipment, they explored equivalent and whole fractions. They enjoyed playing fraction snap, fraction dominoes and identifying missing fractions in pairs.



Electricity

Electricity was Junior 4's Trinity Term Science topic. The children began by identifying the symbols used when drawing circuits and then made a simple circuit, before they skilfully added more components, such as a range of switches before they progressed to adding a buzzer and then a motor.



Music Technology Workshop

Junior 4 enjoyed a half-day music technology workshop hosted by Princethorpe's Director of Music, Gil Cowlishaw. The children were introduced to computer music production concepts such as sequencing and arrangement and then encouraged to experiment. Using the technology software Soundtrap, the children enjoyed creating music in a completely new way.



Sunflowers

In May, Junior 4 took the opportunity to plant sunflowers. After nurturing their sunflowers from seeds into young plants in the classroom, the children prepared a hole, added some compost and gently eased their sunflower out of its pot and into the ground. The sunflowers grew quickly stretching high up the wall, cheerfully greeting anyone who ascended the front steps on their way into school.



French Sport

Junior 4 enjoyed exploring sport in their French lessons. They were fascinated by the Tour de France and they had many interesting questions about the logistics of the race. The children showcased their creativity and dictionary skills when designing their own Tour de France top with motivational language on the front. They learnt that French nouns have a gender, how to give their opinions on different sports and to use adjectives with 'c'est'.



Estimating Time

Junior 4 used their estimating skills and knowledge of Time when they took their Maths lessons outside in the summer sun. The pupils collaborated together to estimate minutes and seconds for different tasks. They used stop watches with expert precision to record the actual times and then filled in their own charts to see if their estimation was near the actual time.



Junior 3H





Place Value

Junior 3 flexed their place value muscles in Maths, adeptly recognising the value of each digit and becoming flexible in partitioning numbers in different ways. The children loved using base 10 to show their understanding.



Perfect Prepositions

Pupils had a wonderful time learning about prepositions of place, as they took turns to position little Lego men in a Stone Age camp setting. They also got to grips with the trickiest of homophones: their, there and they're, and now know some clever tricks to help remember which spelling to use.



Stone Age Diet

Their Stone Age topic linked beautifully with Science lessons when pupils learned about the types of food that a Stone Age person would have eaten. The children discovered that they eat quite differently from their ancient ancestors, although fruit and vegetables did form an integral part of their diet too. Ms Holmes brought in a Mesolithic bark-platter for the children to look at. It included mushrooms, berries, seeds, leaves and fruits as well as chicken, bran and grains.



Bridging Through 10

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In Maths, Junior 3 practised the strategy of bridging through 10 to help them quickly and efficiently add numbers mentally. They used a super resource called the 'Rekenrek' to help visualise the numbers and spot the bond to 10.

Caveman Craft

Pupils worked hard in English lessons, planning their own Stone Age characters complete with captivating details such as scars, missing teeth, and windswept hair. They drew inspiration from their Art and DT lessons where they had made Stone Age tooth and shell necklaces out of clay and twine. Their caveman craft looked both fetching and fearsome.



Rainy Day

Junior 3 generated some fantastic descriptive language to describe a rainy day. It was helpful that the weather played along, providing them 'dull and dreary' inspiration. The classroom was 'awash' with adjectives, adverbs, similes and onomatopoeias as they discussed the fizzy crackle of lightening, the pitter-patter of drumming raindrops and the sky as grey as a wet blanket. All that vocabulary development was put to good use when they embarked on writing their own stories inspired by core text *Lila and the Secret of Rain.*



Times Tables

Maths lessons were alive with excitement when Junior 3 got to grips with the 3x table. They explored equal groups, built arrays and even made bead strings to represent and help them count in groups of three. They worked hard to master the tricky threes.



Super Storyboards

Junior 3 absolutely loved storyboard writing. They worked on a story of their own, a tale of someone trying to prevent flooding in Kenilworth by telling the best jokes they can to the rainy sky. Some jokes 'hit the spot', others fell like a damp squib but the pesky rain kept falling. They used a storyboard to sequence their stories, helping maintain the flow and pace. They were all so creative much to the delight of their teachers.



Science of Nappies

In Science, pupils investigated which nappy was the most absorbent. After closely examining the structure and properties of disposable nappies, they planned a fair test. They were careful with their measuring and repeated the tests to ensure that every element was rigorous and fair. The results were gathered and recorded and presented to the class.

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Friction

Junior 3 found out about 'friction' in their Science lessons. To complete a fair test, the children explored and investigated how far a small toy car would travel from a ramp across different surfaces. They discovered that the smoother the surface, the less friction was present. They tested on Astroturf, wooden floors, carpets, a big furry rug and paving slabs. They discovered that the rug was the surface that created the most friction – 2cm to be exact.



RE Psalms

Pupils explored the psalms in their RE lessons with Mrs Jackson-Mayne. The children worked collaboratively in their small groups to put actions to a psalm. They worked so well in their teams, suggesting actions that helped them to memorise the words and after some practise, performed their psalms to the other groups. Mrs Jackson-Mayne was so impressed with the children's performances, that they showcased them to the rest of the school in Assembly.



Division Skills

Junior 3 used 'bar modelling' to assist them with developing their division skills – their bar models were beautifully drawn, with each 'box', 'group' or 'shared between' being represented with increasing precision. The class was never so quiet as when the children were focused and concentrating on accurate maths skills.



Egyptian Technology

Junior 3 loved their History lessons, and learning about the Ancient Egyptians. They explored how farmers grew their crops and which farming tools they may have used, the plough, the sickle and the mattock. However, it was the great irrigation system, the shaduf, which really sparked their attention. They made a mini one each, using a range of resources, focused on balance and stability. The children were amazed to find out that this implement is still used today and marvelled at the footage of one in action from 1940 where dozens of shadufs in a long and rickety line, moved water up a hill to a field.



Mummification

Junior 3 were introduced to the gruesome process of mummification, as they furthered their knowledge of the 'Awful Ancient Egyptians'. After a fascinating explanation, they got to test out their skills in mummification on a ...tomato! This messy and hilarious process really gave them all a hands-on understanding, although many were mighty relieved that they were working with tomatoes and not dead bodies!



Death Masks

Junior 3 had a wonderful time in their Art lessons in their Egyptian topic. They explored the glorious golden masks of the Pharaohs and created their own wonderful art pieces which the children loved making. They learnt how to lay out a face shape correctly using perspective and white crayon. They really looked amazing!



Fair Trade

Pupils investigated Fair Trade products and where our food comes from. They learned how farmers across the world are treated and how Fair Trade guarantees farmers a fair price. They made lovely Fair Trade world designs to show how much they appreciate farmers' efforts.



Rock Fest

Junior 3 had a right 'rock fest' when they explored the geology of the world through 'Rocks, Soil and Fossils' in Science and Geography. Children investigated the features of different rocks and where they may have come from all those billions of years ago! Fascinating stuff and thanks to Ms Holmes' stonemason neighbour, they had some amazing examples to look at.



Soil Scientists

There was lots of excitement when Junior 3's intrepid scientists explored and investigated different types of soils. They turned the classroom into a full-on laboratory as they used magnifying glasses to identify different types of soils from all over the UK. They looked at rock-types, insect life, decaying matter and the plant and animal life to be found within the samples and discovered the soil was teeming with tiny life.



First News

Pupils in Junior 3 discovered how to write a newspaper report by scanning the pages of First News, a monthly, children's newspaper-style publication. The pupils loved working out how all the features of a report come together through the skills of the journalists and editors to provide a newsy and entertaining resource. It was a fantastic, hands-on way to strengthen and stretch their language and literacy skills.



The Rainforest

Pupils explored the rainforest by taking a journey to the Equator via the story of *'The Kapok Tree,'*. An amazing tale telling the story of a lone tree in the jungle, facing felling by a timber company worker. The children are already environmentally aware so were able to confidently research and share facts and then engage in class discussions on the importance of the rainforests.

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Ancient Greece

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Junior 3 explored Ancient Greece in the Trinity Term and enjoying immersing themselves in Greek myths. Their topic theme wove its way across their subject lessons, from English through History and on to Art. Ms Holmes' class learned about Troy and the Trojan Horse, gathering ideas, adjectives and adverbs to write an acrostic poem to encapsulate the terror of being packed inside the wooden horse. After all their ingenuity, Mrs Paphitis brought in traditional Greek food as a treat to share and the children enjoyed tasting stuffed vine leaves, pitta and traditional Greek dips!



Transpiration

Junior 3 studied plants, investigating their different parts and functions. The children conducted experiments on transpiration, the process by which plants take up the water and move it up the stem until it eventually reaches the leaves and petals. Using coloured water, in this case red, pupils set up their experiments using celery and white flowers. By the next day they were amazed to see that their plant samples were a very different colour.

Conqueror Castles

Junior 2 began their year exploring the topic of castles and started by finding out about William the Conqueror and why he introduced castles into Britain. The children then learnt about the different parts of castles and what they were for and, as part of their cross curricular learning, in their Art lesson they created their own chalk drawing of a castle using pieces of mosaic paper to add interesting detail.



Material Monsters

In their Science lessons, Junior 2 discussed the materials all around us before going on a material investigation tour around the school. They investigated the properties of materials, discovering what things are made from and learning how they are used. Their topic concluded with the children all designing and making their own material monsters using recycled materials.



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Warwick Castle Trip

To conclude their Castles topic, Junior 2 visited the medieval fortress Warwick Castle. They walked under the portcullis before visiting the Great Hall where they saw a knight in armour with his horse, along with a jaw dropping display of swords and spears. They enjoyed a guided tour and found out all about the castle's fascinating history. They visited the Time Tower, and virtually walked through the ages learning lots from spellbinding story clips that brought life in the castle vividly to life.



Police Visit

As part of Vocations Week, Junior 2 were visited by three police officers. Pupils enjoyed finding out about what the police do. They all sat in the police car, discovered what equipment the cars have and were even allowed to put the lights and siren on! Inside, the children tried on uniforms and then worked in teams to use ultraviolet torches to look for clues. A Q&A followed where pupils learned a lot about the police force today.



Praisecopters

Pupils in Junior 2 had great fun making Praisecopters in their RE lesson. Assistant Head, Ms McAloon, encouraged the children to write their heartfelt prayers for things they were thankful for - from family pets to the whole world! They then added some colour before letting them flutter safely down the stairwell. It was a lovely way to say thank you to God.



Stretchy Socks

In readiness for Odd Socks Day, Junior 2 experimented with stretching socks in Science. They discovered that some socks could even double in length when stretched. They put their maths skills to good use to work out which sock had the biggest difference between its actual length and its stretched length and then discussed how to make their experiments more scientific to ensure a fair test.



Puppet Skills

Junior 2 had lots of fun creating puppets in class. The children produced great pieces showcasing several skills, including sewing, cutting, and sticking. There were characters ranging from gingerbread men to Hermione Granger. We were particularly impressed that one pupil turned his friend into a superhero!



Balloon Dogs

The children finished off their Science module on squash, twist, bend and stretch by showcasing their newly learned understanding and skills on model balloons. Junior 2 worked hard to follow a set of instructions to create a balloon dog. Their results were very impressive.



Marshmallow Maths

In Maths the children had lots of fun producing 3D shapes using spaghetti and marshmallow. This was a very tricky challenge for some, but the children showed great resilience and achieved some fabulous shapes.



Noun Phrases

Junior 2 worked hard in their English lessons strengthening their writing using nouns. Using the class text, *The Magic Paintbrush* by Julia Donaldson, the children created imaginative expanded phrases, with some children even adding similes to their sentences.



Cherry Blossom Trees

In the Lent Term, the children studied China and enjoyed lots of cross curricular learning. They had fun creating The Great Wall of China using Lego, produced beautiful paintings of Cherry Blossom trees in Art, and celebrated Chinese New Year by making vegetable spring rolls.



Fruit Salad Science

In Science, Junior 2 discussed their favourite snacks and what alternative healthy snacks they could have. As a Friday afternoon treat, they all made a fruit kebab and thoroughly enjoyed eating their healthy snack.



Forest Fun

Year 2 went into Windmill Wood and learned about habitats and how animals have specific needs, such as the need for shelter, the correct temperature, or a place to keep them safe from predators. They discovered different animals are suited to different habitats and that where they live may depend on what they need to eat and what type of animal they are. All the children had fun creating habitats for the animals we might find in the Forest School area.



Great Fire of London

To support their study of The Great Fire of London, the children visited Aston Hall where they had a guided tour and explored the history of the Great Fire in a historic setting. In an interactive session they found out about Thomas Farriner, King Charles II and Samuel Pepys. Pupils also learnt 17th century fire-fighting methods, trying their hands at lifting the heavy fire hook and passing a leather fire bucket along a line.



The Last Supper

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During the Lent Term, Junior 2 were kept busy creating delightful 'Lord's Supper' mosaics, as part of their investigations into the chronology of Holy Week. The children cut and shaped card to demonstrate their understanding of The Last Supper. Their superb work went on display in the Art Room.



The Tin Forest

In English, in the Trinity Term, the children studied *The Tin Forest* by Helen Ward. Junior 2 were captivated by the poetic fable written about an old man who lives in a Tin Forest, otherwise known as a rubbish dump of unloved things. Their engagement helped them produce superb descriptions of the man in *The Tin Forest* story and allowed them to cement their use of prepositions and expanded noun phrases as they applied it to their writing.



Curious Creatures

As part of their topic on Rainforests, the children were thrilled to have the opportunity to handle curious creatures, under close supervision. They met an Amazonian Milk Frog and a White Tree Frog, both of which were extremely jumpy. The Crested Gecko was a little calmer, content to sit in the palm of a hand and the Argentine Tegu Lizard was a marvel to see as he explored the astro-area specially laid out for him.

Skeleton Science

Junior 1's first Science topic of the year was 'Who am I?', and they learnt about the different body parts people have and that inside their body is a skeleton. Using cotton buds and art straws, they cleverly made a picture of their skeleton and found out that where our arms and legs bend there are joints.



Mighty Writer

Using the *Little Red Hen* as their focus in English, they first listened to the story, before using their Mighty Writer mat to help create the story in picture form. This helped them to re-tell the story in the correct order without forgetting any of the main parts.

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Our Local Area

In Geography, Junior 1 enjoyed a walk around the local area noticing plenty of features near the school. They recorded the different types of houses and the bricks and materials used to construct them. Back in class they created a map of the local area showing all the information they had recorded. There is no chance of anyone getting lost now!



Recorder Skills

In Junior 1 pupils learn recorder with our Director of Music, Mrs Olden. The children made great progress and it wasn't long before they were playing in front of the whole school in assembly.



Victorian Visit

In October, the children visited St John's Museum in Warwick as part of their History topic on the Victorians. Everyone loved the immersive experience which really brought the Victorians to life. The highlight of the day was the 1888 school room led by a School Ma'am where everyone got the chance to do their reading and arithmetic by rote, use a class abacus for their sums and practise their handwriting using chalk and slates.



Shape Sorting

In their Maths lessons the children explored 2 and 3D shapes. They learnt the names of the most common shapes, counted how many sides they had, and vertices and faces. Using this information, they then sorted them according to their different properties and discovered that sometimes there is more than one way to sort a group of shapes!



Jack And The Beanstalk

Junior 1 were delighted to receive a letter from Jack's mother. His poor mother was so worried that he had disappeared, and she was confused about the beanstalk which had grown outside her window. The children all eagerly sat down to write their replies, reassuring her that Jack was indeed safe and well, and he would be returning with some golden coins. Imagine their delight when Jack's mother replied to say thank you, and left her own gift of chocolate coins for everyone to enjoy.



Christingles

The children marked the start of Advent by lighting the first Advent candle in the school's assembly. This led to them learning about the Christingle and how the light of the candle represents Jesus at Christmas time. They made a Christingle each, using an orange, a candle, sweets, dried fruit and a red ribbon. It was a fascinating way to learn about Jesus' love for them all.



Afternoon Tea

After exploring 'Our Local Area' in Geography pupils moved on to look at the wider UK. By using Google maps they were able to zoom in on the United Kingdom and see how tiny we are compared to the rest of the world. They took a whistle stop tasting tour around the four countries of the UK nations and stopped in England for Afternoon Tea.



Viking Longboats

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In History, Junior 1 learnt all about the Vikings and in a cross curricular link made models of a Viking longboat, an early mode of transport that helped the Vikings to invade other countries and trade goods. They researched Viking longboats before carefully creating their replica complete with large sails. They all looked magnificent.



Science Insulators

Pupils were excited when they undertook an experiment to test out different insulators. Everyone made a prediction whether tin foil, bubble wrap, felt, cotton or cotton wool would be the best. To ensure it was a fair test they poured equal amounts of water, at the same temperature, into a test tube that was wrapped in the different materials and then compared the temperature of each one at five-minute intervals.



Wind Power

In DT, the children made a wind-powered vehicle, using straws, wheels and wooden doweling. It had a large sail to catch the wind and propel it along, like a land yacht. There was sheer delight on the children's faces when they tested them with a hair dryer and they flew across the floor.



Hot Air Balloons

As part of their topic on Transport, Junior 1 made their own hot air balloons. Everyone worked carefully to build up the papier mache balloon, layering their balloon with glue and tissue paper. It was very sticky work, but the finished balloons all looked amazing.



Transport Museum Trip

As part of their History studies pupils visited the Transport Museum. They took part in a workshop on bicycles before exploring the rest of the displays. They were fascinated to see how big older vehicles were, including a Penny Farthing, which they all had a chance to try out.



Windmill Wood

In March, winter came to Windmill Wood and what a day for Junior 1 to have Forest School! The children had great fun making 'snow cakes' in the kitchen, whizzing down the slopes on make-shift sledges and thoroughly enjoying the opportunity to play in the snow!



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Measuring

Pupils learned about measurement in Maths. They began by comparing the length of different objects before measuring them with cubes. They then moved on to develop their ruler skills, first using a ruler to measure a line in centimetres before then drawing their own straight lines of a given length.



Weight And Mass

Pupils explored weight and mass in Maths with lots of practical investigations. The children were most interested to find out that a small thing could actually be heavier than a bigger thing!



Lovely Ladybirds

Junior 1 enjoyed combining their Science, English and Art lessons in their study of wildlife in the UK. They researched different types of insects, labelled them, and wrote about their habitats. As part of their learning, they all created the most amazing ladybirds which we put on display in the classroom.



Butterflies

Junior 1 were excited to release their butterflies in June, after watching them grow through their four stages of life. Each one had begun life as an egg, hatched into a caterpillar, pupated into a chrysalis before metamorphosing into an adult butterfly. 








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
